CHAIRMAN'S REPORT by Alan F. Taylor

At the December meeting we welcomed our speaker, member and author Vince Williams who presented us with his illustrated talk on the history of St. Martins Church. Vince started by claiming St Martins is the oldest church in the area; nobody challenged him so we can assume it to be correct. He showed us a map dating from 1713 and Andrews & Dury & William Herbert's map of 1779; and on both maps he pointed out the church.

There is a doorway and window of Saxon origin, the chancel is 13th century the nave, Enbrook chapel, south aisle and tower are 14th century and the north aisle, porch and vestry are 19th century. The earliest illustration known is 1847 and the first photograph (without the north) aisle is 1872.

The lych gate was erected to celebrate Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee and it was moved to its present position in the early 20th century. At one time the church field was used for an army-tented camp. In the Enbrook chapel there is a memorial stone for Mrs Elizabeth Raleigh, granddaughter of Sir Walter Raleigh who died aged 30 years on 26th October 1716. Vince went on to show us pictures of Rectors and views around the Parish including the church halls, finishing with the community centre, which was opened in 1996.

Sixty-four people attended the meeting, five of whom were visitors.

On Friday 7th December thirty-five members and friends had Christmas dinner at the indoor Bowls club in Cheriton Road.

At the February meeting our speaker should have been Brian Doorne talking about the Royal Military Canal but due to ill health he was unable to come. Don and Shirley rang round and managed to get Cyril Baldwin who gave us a talk entitled A Light Hearted Look at Auctions.

Cyril ran an Estate Agents business in Gillingham and after founding an antique and collectors club he started auctioneering and later became dispersant auctioneers, in other words they sold items from people who went to the wall. In some cases it was because they couldn't pay their income tax or VAT.

He told us that auctions were started 1744 by Samuel Baker who started selling books by auctioning them and that Sotheby's has a direct link to Samuel Baker.

He also told us that an auctioneer has the right to turn down a bid for reasons such as being under 21 years of age, for being drunk and if the auctioneer thought you were insane.

Do's and Don'ts when attending an auction: always read the catalogue, don't put anything in an auction if you don't think it will sell, with items of furniture make sure the cupboards and drawers are empty and finally make sure you know what the item is worth

If you are nervous about bidding or you cannot make the sale you can get the porter to bid for you.

It was a most interesting and entertaining talk giving an insight into the art of auctioneering.

No luggage allowed. The South Eastern Company's splendid Steam-ships will make short trips to sea, at low fares, to view the Regatta and French Coast. Military Bands from Shorncliffe Camp will perform during

the day at Folkestone. A table d'Hote at the Pavilion Hotel at 7.0 p.m. Tickets (for which previous application should be made), 5s each.

Conditions - all boats to be entered before 3 o'clock, p.m. on Friday the 19th August at the Harbour Master's Office.

At dusk, a Grand Display of FIREWORKS on the Leas, near Langhorne Gardens.

In the Evening a REGATTA BALL will take place, full particulars of which will be duly announced.

Subscriptions will be received to Twelve o'clock on the day of the regatta, by the Treasurer, A.M. Leith, Esq., National Provincial Branch Bank; by any of the Stewards and Committee, or Secretary.

No Booth will be allowed to be erected on the beach without permission of the Committee.

There will be an excursion from London and other parts of the Line on the day of the Regatta.

The South-Eastern Company's Steamers will ply in the Roads during the Regatta, fare 1s 6d. An excursion steamer will also leave Boulogne for the Regatta.
